Captain Meriwether Lewis visits Rotary

Scott Mandrell spoke to the Alton-Godfrey Rotary Club on January 19, 2004 describing his experiences portraying the role of Captain Meriwether Lewis. The role began for Scott as he and his wife were working with the Fife and Drum Corps in St. Charles, Missouri. As 2004 was approaching and plans to commorate the Lewis and Clark Expedition of 1804 were discussed, Scott was invited to portray Captain Meriwether Lewis for the national Lewis and Clark bicentennial commemoration (http://www.lewisandclark.net/).

Scott became a member of the Alton-Godfrey Rotary Club in 1999 just before becoming involved with the Lewis and Clark commemoration. Because of the time away from home the commemoration requires, Scott had to resign as an active member and on January 19th, the Alton-Godfrey Rotary Club awarded Scott honorary membership. Now, as Scott continues West, he can visit Rotary clubs along the way as a member.

Scott is a nationally recognized living history presenter and portrayed Abraham Lincoln for the re-enactment of the Lincoln-Douglas debates which were shown on CSPAN in 1994. He is a teacher at Wydown Middle School in Clayton, Mo., and a former member of the Army's 3rd U.S. Infantry "The Old Guard" fife and drum corps.

The re-enactment is well documented and is featured on the Apple Learning Interchange website (http://ali.apple.com/). Each Thursday, a live web event takes place so classrooms around the world can follow the re-enactment.

Scott reported international interest in the project. He is keeping a daily journal and his entries are regularly posted on the Internet.

Scott began the journey on July 5, 2003 in Washington, D.C. riding on horseback to Fort Pitt, PA. This initial portion of the journey West took two weeks on horse-

Board Minutes for December

The December 8, 2003 meeting of directors of the Alton-Godfrey Rotary Club was called to order at 5:00 p.m., by President Mike McCormick. Others in attendance were Mike Seymour, Tom Juravich, Sharon Johnson, John Rain, Dan Saeger, Sam Stemm, Jeannine Kelly, Ford Phillips, Larry Hauck, Josh Farley, John Keller, Dave Walker, Ron Mayhew, Ed Mosrissey and the Executive Secretary Melissa Seymour.

On a motion by Juravich, seconded by Phillips the minutes were approved. On motion by Juravich, seconded by Walker the treasurer's report was also approved.

In Community Service the Holiday concert and silent auction are scheduled for December 13. Christmas Wonderland at Rock Spring Park is December 9 and the Salvation Army bell ringing is December 20. There are still a few slots opened for the bell ringing.

In Vocational Service, tonight is Student of the Month.

In International, John Rain said with the help of the Jerseyville Club Dr. Schulmeister's equipment will be inventoried.

In new business, on a motion by Dave Walker, seconded by Tom Juravich it was approved to hold the Alton-Godfrey Rotary golf tournament on September 17, 2004. Richard Rook will once again chair the event.

back for Meriwether Lewis. Scott rode the distance using two horses in ten days. A portion of his journal entries follows.

"09 July, 2003 (Wednesday)

Resume my ride this morning at 0830hrs.□ Leave from western side of CharlesTown at the old Hull's Pump.□This is where I had stopped last night and watered Sniper just as countless soldiers had done their horses during the Civil War. □This spot was long known as a place where both man and horse could take refreshment. From here I headed West on Rt. 51. Shortly after leaving CharlesTown, I passed the Altona, a strikingly beautiful farm with a stone wall running the length of the property.□ It is likely that Lewis passed this very farm. Ust beyond there was the ruin of an 18th Century church and the now defunct village of Piedmont.□ We continued on, Sniper and I, until we came to Harewood. □ This home, built in 1771 by George Washington's brother, is still in their family.□ Walter Washington lives here today.□ Our stop was brief as there were two horses in the paddock and Sniper was restless about it. From here we continued on until we came to the Old Middleway Road which took us left off of the main road and led into the historic village of Middleway.□ This crossroads, founded in 1735, was originally called Smithfield.□It's place on the livery route later spurred the change. □ We were greeted by several inhabitants of the hamlet eager to share local history. □The support team fed Sniper and me and we moved on.□ Out of this town we headed almost due West. It was not too terribly long before we were met with the prospect of crossing the Opequon Creek.□ This creek, which is more like a small river, separates Virginia and West Virginia. It's difficult in this region to know exactly what state you are in in some places. This is one of those places.□ Sniper and I forded the river with only my boots getting wet. He is a tremendous horse. We continue on and soon find ourselves in the midst of a gathering storm. Thunder and lightning soon envelope us and we move into the treeline. □ I change into my oilskin slicker and we hold for a little while in a depression in a clearing.□ Since both of us were wearing steel, low ground seemed like a good idea. The thunder storm passed and we proceeded on in the fairly heavy rain. Rain was the order of the day. Light traffic, however, made the going manageable. Today's route took us westward to Cross Junction, then to Slanesville and ultimately up to the Ft. Ashby/Cumberland area.□ Stop for the night."
