Alton/Godfrey Rotary Celebrates Rotary International's 100th Birthday

"There are few organizations that last a hundred years," says Glenn Estess, Rotary International president. "The fact that Rotary has reached this important milestone is a sign that there is a tremendous need for all that Rotary offers."

On Wednesday, February 23rd, our club joined thousands of clubs around the globe to celebrate this significant birthday. As President Estess says, just reaching this milestone indicates our organization provides important services. In communities throughout the world, Rotary Clubs are being formed as one way to address the needs of their local population. Because of the Object of Rotary, the 4-Way Test, and our motto "Service above Self", a group of people in a community organized under those guidelines is likely to succeed.

The day following our celebration, a search of the Internet for news stories on what other Rotary Clubs had done to celebrate the 100th year, resulted in over 125 stories posted which did not include our story which appeared in *The Telegraph*.

At noon Wednesday the La Salle, Peru and Illinois Valley Sunrise Rotary clubs joined with clubs across the globe in ringing bells to ceremonially ring in the 100th year of the service organization. Sunrise Rotary President Mark Dudek led the 65 Rotarians in attendance in a toast to usher in the anniversary year

In St Croix, Virgin Islands the past president in remarks said, "in the 47 years that the local club has been in existence it has followed the example of Rotary International and has donated more than \$1 million to the community and raised more than \$90,000 for the Rotary Foundation."

In Slidell, Louisiana, despite the pouring rain, a crowd gathered under the Heritage Park gazebo to help the Slidell Northshore Rotary Club celebrate the 100th birthday of Rotary International as well as the completion of its centennial project to plant over 300 trees along Pontchartrain Drive. In the crowd were 11 Rotarians from Russia in-



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vited to spend the week with host families in Slidell. "This is the best thing to do for your community, when you do things voluntarily," said Annie Nekrasova, a Rotarian from Volzhsky, Russia. "I will always support such projects."

In Pauls Valley, Oklahoma, Rotarians, the mayor and special guests gathered at Wacker Park to pay tribute to Herbert Taylor and Rotary International by erecting a granite monument in honor of Herbert Taylor in the Memorial Rose Garden and Mayor Gamble declared February 23rd as Rotary Pauls Valley Day in conjunction with Rotary's 100th anniversary. Herbert Taylor created the 4-Way Test and served as this club's third president in 1923-1924 and later as president of Rotary International during the golden anniversary year in 1955-1956.

The Rotary Club Taiwan yesterday issued two sets of stamps with logos that included the word "Taiwan," in order to commemorate the centennial anniversary of the establishment of Rotary International. The two logos feature a dove and a picture of Taiwan, respectively. "It is the first time that stamps have actually been designed by members of the Rotary Club. The design also represents Taiwan's yearning for peace," said Thomas Ong (翁耀堂), one of the two designers of the stamps. The other designer is Wu Chin-sheng (吳進生). Both designers are members of Rotary Club Taipei Banka, a chapter of Rotary Club Taiwan District 3480.

In Chennai, India, Chief Minister J Jayalalithaa has called for a concerted and coordinated effort to put down terrorist forces and said hesitation and absence of firmness in this regard would only strengthen the hands of such outfits that would be emboldened to consider the State as a soft target. Speaking after receiving the Lifetime Achievement Award and the Paul Harris Fellow Recognition at a function organised for the centennial celebration of the Rotary Movement here yesterday, the Chief Minister said the forces of globalisation have opened up the world not only for the growth of international trade, but for the growth of global terrorism as well. Thanking the Rotary Movement for conferring the award, Jayalalithaa said, "I have tried to envision, formulate and implement policies which measures up to the high ethical standards embedded in Mahatma Gandhi's Talisman and Rotary's Fourway test."
