





I could speak volumes of the opportunities I've been granted from being an Alton High School Redbird. When I came to Alton High from a class of just sixteen students, I thought I might get lost in the crowd of more than 2000 students. However, as



I enter my fourth year of school, I strongly believe that the larger school has given me unparalleled opportunities and resources.

Throughout my years at Alton High, I've had the chance to attend several trips and workshops with the goal of promoting leadership. As a class officer, I've travelled to Chicago and Springfield to collaborate with hundreds of other high school student council members from across the state. However one of my most memorable journeys came at the end of my sophomore year, shortly after being elected President of the Interact Club for the upcoming year. Two other students and I had the chance to attend the 3-day Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) at Bradley University in Peoria.

For those who don't know, RYLA is a leadership training program for Interact Club members. I was a bit skeptical at first as to what a weekend of "leadership training" would consist of, and I wondered how a three day retreat with mostly strangers could be educating and engaging at the same time. I was in for a surprise. When I left at the end of the weekend, I hadn't slept much, but wouldn't trade the lessons I learned or memories I made for anything.

I arrived around supper time on Friday, and took part in several ice breakers. It wasn't long before I realized this was a far cry from the ordinary youth retreat. As we walked to dinner the first night I was

drove me to become a vegetarian, for I did not want to support such a cause. I was also exposed to other documentaries like "Earthlings" concerning everything form strays and homeless animals being mistreated, to videos concerning animals being slaughtered for not only food, but also their fur. With the new found knowledge of what was happening to our animals, I developed a mindset to do whatever I could to help them. I even vowed that if ever given the opportunity, although it is a bit out of my character, I would do PETA's campaign, "I'd Rather Go Naked Than Wear Fur," for I would do anything to support a cause I feel so strongly about. Yet, even with me being a strong animal lover all my life which could be emphasized by the fact that my family owned thirteen cats at once and my attachment to every other animal I've come into contact with, not supporting animal cruelty (not even hitting the little squirrels in the street), and becoming a vegetarian, something in my heart told me that this still was not enough. Then it hit me, metaphorically speaking, while browsing through majors and professional tracks offered at Mizzou University, when I came across pre-veterinary medicine. This might be it.

Unfortunately, just recently, my career plans which I figured were set in stone became questionable. I began to also consider majoring in preveterinary medicine, rather than in law or psychology. Of course I still want to help others (which I found to be my niche), but do I still necessarily want to become a lawyer which has always been my childhood dream? As of today, I am still seeking the answer to this question. Sometimes dreams change as time progresses in life and we get older, but the one thing that has not changed, whether I follow my childhood dream of becoming a lawyer or a psychiatrist, or take a bit of a different path and become a veterinarian... all paths somewhat different from one another, yet the same in terms of fulfilling my ambition, is my childhood desire to help someone... or something. Back then, I could give a very thorough answer to the infamous question, "What do you want to be when you grow up?" Yet, today, I will say, "I have my heart set on being somebody who makes a difference in the world, somebody that has an impact on the lives of others... I want to be somebody that helps those in need." Of course, this is a more broad answer, but I am still finding my way and feel that Mizzou is the perfect place for me to do just so.
